Re:	Notice of Funding Status

Dear Participants and Beneficiaries:

Enclosed is a Notice regarding the funding status of the PACE Industry Union-Managem ent Pension Fund ("Fund"). The Notice is being sent to you as required by the Pension Protection Act of 2006 ("PPA"). As the enclosed Notice states, the Fun d's actuary has certified that the Fund is in critical status, or the "red zone" for Plan Year beginning January 1, 2013. As we advised you the past three years, because of this certification, some benefits that we re previously available under the F und's Plan of benefits have been reduced or eliminated, such as the post-retirement 60-month guarantee and the Social Security Level Income Option. You were notified of all the changes in benefits by letter dated July 30, 2010.

Also enclosed is a copy of the Fund's 2012 Annual Funding Notice, which is also required to be provided to you by law. This Notice is very similar to the one that you received last year. The content and wording of this Notice are governed by federal law and all multiem ployer defined benefit pension funds are required to issue similar notices annually.

Finally, enclosed is a Summary of Material Modification ("SMM") regarding changes to the Plan.

NOTICE OF CRITICAL STATUS CERTIFICATION FOR PACE INDUSTRY UNION-MANAGEMENT PENSION FUND

The purpose of this Notice is to inform you that, on March 29, 2013, the actuary of the PACE Industry Union-Management Pension Fund ("Fund") certified to the U.S. Department of the Treasury, and also to the Board of Trustees of the Fund, that the Fund is in critical status for the Plan Year beginning January 1, 2013. Federal law requires that you receive this Notice.

Critical Status

The Fund is considered to be in cr itical status because it has funding or liquidity pr oblems, or both. More specifically, the Fund's actuary determined that the Fund is projected to have an accumulated funding deficiency within the next four (4) years. This means that contributions will not be enough to meet government standards for funding promised benefits plus those that participants are currently earning.

Rehabilitation Plan and Possibility of Reduction in Benefits

Federal law requires pension plans in critical status to ado pt a rehabilitation plan aimed at restoring the financial health of the Fund. The law perm its pension plans to reduce, or even elim inate, benefits called "adjustable benefits" as part of a rehabilitation plan. The Fund's Board of Trustees adopted a Rehabilitation Plan in July 2010 and on July 30, 2010 you received a not—ice describing the benefit reductions that were made as a result of the Plan being in critical status—and the applicable effective dates of these reductions. Any reduction of adjustable b enefits (other than a repe al of a recent benefit increase, as described below) will not reduce the level of a participant's basic benefit p ayable at normal retirement. In addition, the reductions can only apply to those participants and beneficiaries whose benefit commencement date is on or after April 30, 2010. Effective as of April 30, 2010, the Fund is not permitted to pay lump sum benefits (or any other payment in excess of the monthly amount paid—under a single life annuity) while it is in critical status.

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Adjustable Benefits

The Fund offered the following adjustable benefits, som e of which were reduced or elim inated as part of the Fund's rehabilitation plan:

- X Post-retirement death benefits;
- X Sixty-month payment guarantees;
- \underline{X} Disability benefits (not yet in pay status);
- <u>X</u> Early retirement benefit or retirement-type subsidy;
- <u>X</u> Benefit payment options other than a qualified joint and survivor annuity (QJSA);
- X Recent benefit increases (i.e. occurring in the past 5 years);
- X Other similar benefits, rights or features under the Plan (i.e. 120-month payment guarantees, certain preretirement death benefits, "pop-up" benefit)

Employer Surcharge

The law requires that all contributing employers pay to the Fund a surcharge to help correct the Fund's financial situation. The amount of the surcharge is equal to a percentage of the amount an employer is otherwise required to contribute to the Fund under the applicable collective bargaining agreement. Since this is the fourth year that the Fund is in critical status, a 10% surcharge applies for e ach Plan Year in which the Fund is in critical status until the effective date of an agreement between the employer and union that includes terms consistent with the Fund's rehabilitation plan and the Fund's governing documents and policies.

ANNUAL FUNDING NOTICE For PACE Industry Union-Management Pension Fund

Introduction

This notice includes important information about the funding status of your pension plan ("the Plan") and general information about the benefit payments guaranteed by the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation ("PBGC"), a federal insurance agency. All traditional pension plans (called "defined benefit pension plans") must provide this notice every year regardless of their funding status. This notice does not mean that the Plan is terminating. It is provided for informational purposes and you are not required to respond in any way. This notice is for the plan year beginning January 1, 2012 and ending December 31, 2012 ("Plan Year").

How Well Funded Is Your Plan

Under federal law, the plan must report how well it is funded by using a measure called the "funded percentage." This percentage is obtained by dividing the Plan's assets by its liabilities on the Valuation Date for the plan year. In general, the higher the percentage, the better funded the plan. Your Plan's funded percentage for the Plan Year and each of the two preceding plan years is set forth in the chart below, along with a statement of the value of the Plan's assets and liabilities for the same period.

Year -End Fair Market Value of Assets

The asset values in the chart above are measured as of the Valuation Date for the plan year and are actuarial values. Because market values can fluctuate daily based on factors in the marketplace, such as changes in the stock market, pension law allows plans to use actuarial values that are designed to smooth out those fluctuations for funding purposes. The asset values below are market values and are measured as of the last day of the plan year, rather than as of the Valuation Date. Substituting the market value of assets for the actuarial value used in the above c hart would show a clearer picture of a plan's funded status as of the Valuation Date. The fair market value of the Plan's assets as of the last day of the Plan Year and each of the two preceding plan years is shown in the following table:

Critical or Endangered Status

Under federal pension law a plan generally will be considered to be in "endangered" status if, at the beginning of the plan year, the funded percentage of the plan is less than 80 percent or in "critical" status if the percentage is less than 65 percent (other factors may also a pply). If a pension plan enters endangered status, the trustees of the plan are required to adopt a funding improvement plan. Similarly, if a pension plan enters critical status, the trustees of the plan are required to adopt a rehabilitation plan. Rehabilitation and funding improvement plans establish steps and benchmarks for pension plans to improve their funding status over a specified period of time.

The Plan was in "critical" status for the Plan Year ending December 31, 2012 because the Plan was projected to have an accumulated funding deficiency in the next four years. In an effort to improve the Plan's funding situation, the Trustees adopted a

Rehabilitation Plan on July 17, 2010 designed to assist the Plan in meeting the applicable benchmarks established by law. The Rehabilitation Plan describes the actions to be taken by the Plan's Trustees, and the benefit and contribution changes that affect employers and participants. The Plan's Board of Trustees will update the Rehabilitation Plan as required by law.

You may obtain a copy of the Plan's Rehabilitation Plan and the actuarial and financial data that demonstrate any action taken by the plan toward fiscal improvement by contacting the plan administrator. If the Plan is in endangered or critical status for the plan year ending December 31, 2013, separate notification of that status has or will be provided.

Participant Information

The total number of participants in the plan as of the Plan's valuation date was 75,248. Of this number, 17,932 were active participants, 28,786 were retired or separated from service and receiving benefits, and 28,530 were retired or separated from service and entitled to future benefits.

Funding & Investment Policies

Every pension plan must have a procedure for establishing a funding policy to carry out plan objectives. A funding policy relates to the level of assets needed to pay for benefits promised under the plan currently and over the years. The funding policy of the Plan is to fund the Plan through a combination of contributions received from employers and investment income generated by the Plan's investments. The funding level is designed to comply with requirements of ERISA and the Internal Revenue Code. These requirements include minimum funding levels and also include maximum limits on the contributions that may be deducted by employers for federal income tax purposes. The B oard of Trustees creates and implements the funding policy and monitors the funding level with the assistance of the Plan's enrolled actuary and the investment consultant.

Once money is contributed to the Plan, the money is invested by plan officials called fiduciaries, who make specific investments in accordance with the Plan's investment policy. Generally speaking, an investment policy is a written statement that provides the fiduciaries who are responsible for plan investments with guidelines or general instructions concerning investment management decisions. The investment policy of the Plan has been adopted by the Board of Trustees with the advice of the Plan's investment consultant. It is intended to generate returns that equal or exceed the Plan's actuarial assumed rate of return of 7.5% over the long term and to control risk. Based on the advice of the investment consultant, the Trustees have diversified the Plan's investments with allocations to a number of different asset classes.

Under the Plan's investment policy, the Plan's assets were allocated among the following categories of investments, as of the end of the Plan Year. These allocations are percentages of total assets and based on preliminary, unaudited financial information:

Right to Request a Copy of the Annual Report

A pension plan is required to file with the US Department of Labor an annual report (called the Form 5500) that contains financial and other information about the plan. Copies of the annual report are available from the US Department of Labor, Employee Benefits Security Administration's Public Disclosure Room at 200 Constitution Avenue, NW, Room N-1513, Washington, DC 20210, or by calling 202-693-8673. For 2009 and subsequent plan years, you may obtain an electronic copy of the plan's annual report by going to www.efast.dol.gov and using the Form 5500 search function. Or you may obtain a copy of the Plan's annual report on the website at www.uswbenefitfunds.com or by making a written request to the plan administrator. The 2012 Form 5 500 will be available after October 15, 2013. Individual information, such as the amount of your accrued benefit under the plan, is not contained in the annual report. If you are seeking information regarding your benefits under the plan, contact the plan administrator identified below under "Where To Get More Information."

Summary of Rules Governing Plans in Reorganization and Insolvent Plans

Federal law has a number of special rules that apply to financially troubled multiemployer plans. The plan administrator is required by law to include a summary of these rules in the annual funding notice. Under so-called "plan reorganization rules," a plan with adverse financial experience may need to increase required contributions and may, under certain circumstances, reduce benefits that are not eligible for the PBGC's guarantee (generally, benefits that have been in effect for less than 60 m onths). If a plan is in reorganization status, it must provide notification that the plan is in reorganization status and that, if contributions are not increased, accrued benefits under the plan may be reduced or an excise tax may be imposed (or both). The plan is required to furnish this notification to each contributing employer and the labor organization.

Despite the special plan reorganization rules, a plan in reorganization could become insolvent. A plan is insolvent for a plan year if its available fina ncial resources are not sufficient to pay benefits when due for the plan year. An insolvent plan must reduce benefit payments to the highest level that can be paid from the plan's available financial resources. If such resources are not enough to pay benefits at a level specified by law (see Benefit Payments Guaranteed by the PBGC, below), the plan must apply to the PBGC for financial assistance. The PBGC will loan the plan the amount necessary to pay benefits at the guaranteed level. Reduced benefits may be restored if the plan's financial condition improves.

A plan that becomes insolvent must provide prompt notification of its status to participants and beneficiaries, contributing employers, labor unions representing participants, and PBGC. In addition, participants and beneficiaries also must receive information regarding whether, and how, their benefits will be reduced or affected, including loss of a lump sum option. This information will be provided for each year the plan is insolvent.

Benefit Payments Guaranteed by the PBGC

The maximum benefit that the PBGC guarantees is set by law. Only benefits that you have earned a right to receive and that cannot be forfeited (called vested benefits) are guaranteed. Specifically, the PBGC guarantees a monthly benefit payment equal to 100 percent of the first \$11 of the Plan's monthly benefit accrual rate, plus 75 percent of the next \$33 of the accrual rate, times each year of credited service. The PBGC's maximum guarantee, therefore, is \$35.75 per month times a participant's years of credited service.

Example 1: If a participant with 10 years of credited service has an accrued monthly benefit of \$500, the accrual rate for purposes of determining the PBGC guarantee would be determined by dividing the monthly benefit by the participant's years of service (\$500/10), which equals \$50. The guaranteed amount for a \$50 monthly accrual rate is equal to the sum of \$11 plus \$24.75 (.75 x \$33), or \$35.75. Thus, the participant's guaranteed monthly benefit is \$357.50 (\$35.75 x 10).

Example 2: If the participant in Example 1 has an accrued monthly benefit of \$200, the accrual rate fo r purposes of determining the guarantee would be \$20 (or \$200/10). The guaranteed amount for a \$20 monthly accrual rate is equal to the sum of \$11 plus \$6.75 (.75 x \$9), or \$17.75. Thus, the participant's guaranteed monthly benefit would be \$177.50 (\$17.75 x 10).

The PBGC guarantees pension benefits payable at normal retirement age and some early retirement benefits. In calculating a person's monthly payment, the PBGC will disregard any benefit increases that were made under the plan within 60 months before the earlier of the plan's termination or insolvency (or benefits that were in effect for less than 60 months at the time of termination or insolvency). Similarly, the PBGC does not guarantee pre-retirement death benefits to a spouse or beneficiary (e.g., a qualified pre-retirement survivor annuity) if the participant dies after the plan terminates, benefits above the normal retirement benefit, disability benefits not in pay status, or non-pension benefits, such as health insurance, life insurance, death benefits, vacation pay, or severance pay.

Dear Participant:

The Board of Trustees of the PACE Industry y Union-Management Pension Fund ("Fund") has adopted the following changes to the PACE Industry Union-Management Pension Plan ("Plan"). This letter summarizes the changes. All page num bers refer to the Summary Plan Description ("SPD"). Please keep this document with your SPD, so that you always know the benefits that you are eligible for and the rules that apply to you.

SUMMARY OF MATERIAL MODIFICATIONS

1. Effective November 15, 2012, Section IV, "Do I Need to 'Retire' To Receive Benefits?", on page 10 of the SPD, is deleted and replaced with the following:

DO I NEED TO "RETIRE" TO RECEIVE BENEFITS?

Under all Programs, to receive a pension you must retire prior to the date your pension benefits commence. For purposes of this Plan, "retire" means that you have ceased being employed for at least 30 consecutive days by any contributing employer or employer that has a collective bargaining agreement with the Union. If you are under age 65, "retire" also means that you have ceased being employed for at least 30 consecutive days by any other employer in the same business as any employer that has a collective bargaining agreement with the Union, and in a trade or craft in which you were employed at any time under the Plan. These requirements apply regardle so of the reason, you term inated covered employment or when you terminated covered employment. You are considered retired as of the first day you cease such employment.

2. Section IV, "How Do I Becom e Eligible For an Early Retirement Pension?", second paragraph, on page 11 of the SPD, is clarified to read as follows:

For Program G – You are eligible to retire on an Early Retirement Pension if you are at least age 55, but under age 65, and you have at least 5 years of pension credit and 1 year of future service credit. The amount of your Regular Pension will be reduced for an early commencement date (See page 17).

3. Effective May 22, 2012, the second paragrap h of Section VII, "What Will Happen To My Benefit If I Return To W ork After My Benefit Payments Start Or If I Continue To Work After Age 65?", on page 24 of the SPD, is deleted and replaced with the following:

Prohibited Employment means employment with a contributing employer in covered employment, provided that the employment is (i) in the same industry or business as any contributing employer at the time the payment of benefits commenced or would have commenced (ii) in a trade or craft in which you were employed at any time under the Plan, and (iii) in the geographic area covered by the Plan at the time the payment of your benefits commenced or would have commenced. This definition of Prohibited Employment applies to you regardless of the reason, you terminated covered employment or when you terminated covered employment.
